Titled *2011 AND BEYOND*, the programme consists of free curriculum-related films &



filmmaking workshops in several schools in the Pal Place neighbourhood in downtown Toronto.

Three schools are participating: Market Lane public school, St. Michael Catholic School and the Downtown Alternative school, and any acceptable films will be screened at *Commfest 2011* in September and could be eligible to win a prestigious *MADA* (Making A Difference Award) presented at the closing Gala Ceremony.

PAL Halifax has just signed a *Memorandum of Understanding* with the *Housing*

Trust of Nova Scotia hoping to secure affordable apartments in a project currently planned for the developing, arts-based Gottingen Street area. In exchange for a potential “set-aside” of units for our members, we are assisting the Housing Trust in programming the ground-floor space as a vibrant complement to the Gottingen Street community and to our member tenants as well.

Several members of the PAL Halifax board attended a meeting with the *Gottingen Street Merchants' Association*, in which Ross Cantwell, President of the Housing Trust, presented preliminary schemes for the building. Much valuable input was received from the assembled group. While work remains to be done on the part of the Housing Trust and their architect to bring the proposed facility more in line with the scale and character of the community, PAL Halifax is incredibly excited about the prospects.

New board member **Angela Henderson**, who moved to Halifax recently from the interior of British Columbia, is leading the redesign of our PAL Halifax website.

Our dynamic **Ann Pocket** has happily fallen pregnant with twins. Fantastic news, but it does mean we're now looking for an interim administrator.

PAL CALGARY

The final report from Paradox Inc., titled *PAL Calgary: Options for the Future*, was received. It's the summation of a

reassessment of PAL Calgary's role and mandate and a feasibility review to determine what conditions are present for us to pursue affordable housing for artists. Essentially Paradox recommended PAL Calgary develop partnerships with credible existing social housing developers and identified 3 potential future partnerships. PAL Calgary was subsequently contacted by a management company (not one of the three recommended by Paradox) for several affordable housing buildings for seniors in the downtown core. These buildings have around 40 empty bachelor suites and we are in discussions to work with them to help fill those suites (short term) and form a partnership on a more long term basis. Thus we are developing momentum as a proponent of affordable housing for artists in Calgary.

IMPORTANCE OF ARTS IS AGAIN CONFIRMED

What arts organizations have maintained for ages -that the Arts are a major contributor to the economic health of our country- is once again confirmed by a recent survey of Canadians' spending habits. *Hill Strategies Research* found that our average spending on live arts performances in 2008 amounted to \$1.426 billion, or \$108 per household. The survey did not include attendance at free arts events as total attendance numbers were not the purpose of the study. The impressive dollar figure thus represents only the amount of *spending* on live arts performances.

Given the many entertainment options available to Canadians, it is encouraging that so many chose to spend their entertainment dollars on live performances. It was even higher than movie theatre admissions (\$1.216 billion), more than twice the amount spent on sporting events (\$0.645 billion) and on museum and heritage-related activities (\$0.519 billion).

The full report, drawn from *Statistics Canada's Survey of Household Spending*, contains more detail about arts spending based on education, sex, income, age, whether rural and urban households, etc., and may be found at www.hillstrategies.com.

Copies of *Palingenesis* and other useful information can also be found in the *Recently Added Free Downloads* page and you can also take advantage of the site's comprehensive *search* feature by typing a word or two in the search field at the upper right of the page. This will bring you to articles or documents that should be relevant to your interest. Also, for those wishing to donate to PAL there is now an online donations button.

Regarding new content, Lisa is on the lookout for current and useful articles. Her research has taken her to some very diverse places and, in brief, she looks for key words, following possible leads with a critical eye, essentially looking for two things: 1. Is this article from a valid source? 2. Is this article likely to be of interest to the PAL community?

While maintaining a bias towards Canadian sources, articles from all over the world are considered. Most come from government sites, reputable media sources and primary research journals. Topics include physical, mental and financial health, aging, affordable housing, municipal & cultural affairs, and PAL specific topics, such as how to form a new chapter and fundraising.

Articles that are posted elsewhere on the web are shared on the PAL Canada website, with a teaser intro copied directly from that other source, and with a link to the original posting. Articles that are written exclusively for PAL Canada are posted in their entirety.

There are more new developments in store. Aware that the site would benefit from more graphic content, the Committee is tackling that for the next round of updates. In addition, YouTube capability has been built in so that relevant video will now be available. New material will be posted soon.

ANOTHER ORIGINAL LEAVES US

One of the original residents of Toronto's Pal Place has died. Lula Franklin Anderson, who went under the



stage name of Lula Franklin, came from a family of 8 children – all talented in music, song, dance, visual art and crafts, the nursing profession, teachers and sports.

From the age of 15 or so she was singing and dancing, often

with one of her guitar playing brothers, on every amateur show she could find from New York to Montreal, winning many auditions.

She kept up her performing after marriage, maintaining a variety of 9-to-5 jobs to feed the family coffers, and over the years entertained in scores of *Canadian Legion* halls (hubby was a vet), *Children's Variety Clubs*, in community theatres and with private engagements, eventually steering her way into film and TV.

At 80 she auditioned for the Bette Midler film *That Old Feeling*. Director Carl Reiner quickly hired her, crediting her as *Granny Tapper* and, with the others, treated her to 13 days of pampering and fun, schmoozing with the stars. They loved her!

Lula lived at *Pal Place* Toronto since its opening in January of 1993. When her health began to fail, at the age of 81, she was in the good hands of family living there, of *Supporting Cast*, *Personal Support Workers* from *Dixon Hall Supportive Housing*, the local pharmacist, the family Doctor and specialists at *St. Michael's Hospital*. With their support she made it to her 94th birthday. Lula had a great life, lived it well and is now dancing with the angels in Heaven!

PAL STRATFORD'S DOMINI BLYTH

Domini Blythe was a long-time member and strong supporter of PAL Stratford, continuing her keen interest even after taking up residence in Montreal some years ago. PAL Stratford President, John Banks, said her membership renewal letter always had a note "and generally a donation". As recently as last September she contributed a number of items to Stratford's Silent Auction (costume sketches, photos, unique Opening Night gifts) which raised some \$800.



Domini died of lung cancer on 15 December, at 63. She played many leading roles at Stratford between 1976 and 2006 and was praised as an exceptional talent appearing in landmark productions at the Festival. "Domini was a magnificent actor and a luminescent beauty," Artistic Director Des McAnuff said in a statement.

Born into a theatrical family in England, Domini appeared there in productions with the *Royal Shakespeare Company* among others, on NBC's *Search for Tomorrow* in the U.S. and in the CTV series *Mount Royal*. She last appeared on the Stratford stage in 2006. That season she realized a life-long ambition, undertaking a one-woman show, *Fanny Kemble*, written especially for her by her actor/playwright father, Richard Blythe, and created for her by director Peter Hinton. The accompanying stratfordfestival.ca photo is from that acclaimed production.

Domini is survived by her husband, Jean Beaudin; her father, Richard Blythe; brother, Ben Blythe, sister-in-law Andrea Schlieker and their two children Lily and Phinn.

PAL Canada has two new Board members, Stratford's Aggie Elliott and Edmonton's Brenda O'Donnell. Racheal McCaig resigned from the PAL Toronto Board but remains on PAL Canada's as Equity Rep. Paul Shaw now a PAL Canada employee, has resigned his positions on PAL Canada and PAL Toronto Boards.
