
The City is pushing forward with a revitalization plan which out fledgling committee is investigating.

PAL WINNIPEG FOUNDER DIES

He established **PAL Winnipeg,** serving as its only President to date, and long represented his area as ACTRA National Councillor while engaged in an active and successful career. **Wayne Nicklas** died in Duncan, B.C. while on a trip to support fellow Winnipegers appearing in a theatre production on Vancouver Island. A fierce advocate for Winnipeg actors and the acting community at large, Wayne was a towering presence in more ways than one (standing over 6'5" tall). He fought fiercely and eloquently on behalf of others but is remembered as a teddy bear by colleagues. Friend *Stan Lesk* described Wayne as "the kindest, gentlest, greatest guy there was."



With his wife **Judy Cook** and their friend actor-playwright **David King**, Wayne made the trip to B.C. in defiance of his long battle with esophageal cancer. A tribute was organized in June (See story page 8) Expressions of sympathy to Judy and the family and of admiration for Wayne Nicklas' contributions are many, varied and heartfelt. He will be missed.

know as the *Vas Kuchar Roof Terrace*. In addition, a bench, bearing a small plaque, has been placed in a prominent position.



Developments are being watched closely, as is another North End proposal, an assisted housing development on Gottingen Street. Contact has been made with that developer as well. Co**chairs Appointed-** At a recent Board meeting, Eric Stotts and Jeremy Webb were appointed Chapter Co-chairs and expressed thanks to Gary Vermier, who stepped into the breach last year. Gary remains on PAL Halifax and National Boards. Scrabble With the Stars East Set-Reserve 23 October to have loads of fun at a Maritime version of Scrabble With the Stars.



Continued SWTS Improvement-The AGM heard that thegala fundraiser, *Scrabble® With The*

Stars, netted about \$45,000 this year. Corporate sponsors included *Scotiabank Cineplex*, *CBC* and *ACTRA Fraternal*.

You'll get reports as the battle progresses. **Roof Space Renamed**- (See Story p.3)

Seed Funding - Funding to assist in preparing a Business Plan has been granted by CMHC



(upwards of \$10,000) and Tim Welch Consulting Inc. will work on the Plan with our Building Committee, chaired by Gordon Sherwin.

Membership & Profile - A successful membership campaign is launched along with several profile-raising events.

Fundraising Success Continues- The Chapter received a Tyrone Guthrie Award, the Festival sold a **Desmond Heeley** card for the Chapter and **Mimi Vivona** and friends organized a *Tempest in a Tea Pot*. But, *Expect the Extraordinary* remains the major fundraising event. This year's offering generated \$34,000. *Stratford Miscast*, took place 13 September. (*See story page 6*.)

PAL Manitoba is still reeling from the death of Wayne Ncklas (see Front Page story). **Winnipeg Soldiers On-** Since its founding meeting PAL Winnipeg has struggled to become more solidly



established Charitable Status was achieved and various contacts made with all governments regarding a seniors' building, with various sites having been investigated. **Approach to CMHC**- Plans are to apply to CMHC for a feasibility grant and the idea of partnering in a building project

is being actively discussed. **Memorial Fundraiser**-A performance-based fundraiser in memory of Wayne Nicklas was organized in late June. (See *Tribute* p.8)

Plans in the Works- The PAL Calgary Board accepted a proposal from *Paradox Inc* to conduct a feasibility study and develop a strategic plan for the Chapter. They are currently re-assessing Calgary's role and mandate

and researching opportunities for community partnership.

Annual Auction- As happened last year, a silent auction benefitting PAL Calgary was organized at *Jon Lord's Annual Stampede BBQ*, raising \$2700. CMHC Grant -A \$10,000 non-repayable grant was just approved. More next issue.



PAL EDMONTON

(Artists Urban Village) **Edmonton Forges Ahead**- A successful Needs Assessment Survey was completed, with

funding from Canada Mortgage and Housing, earlier this year. Four hundred completed surveys were received and of those 131 expressed interest in an affordable cooperative housing facility. The need and interest within the arts community has been amply demonstrated.

Partnerships- In November PAL Edmonton partnered with Arts Habitat Association of Edmonton for the creation of our first project - an affordable artists housing cooperative. A brand new building is to be purchased from *Edmonton Inner City Housing*. Strong - in some cases resounding- support has been received from the local Business Association, Community League and the Neighbourhood Improvement Association, as well as all the local arts organizations. We hope to announce confirmation of this project in the coming months, stay tuned! The Future? The immediate future will involve working with tenants on the creation of their new cooperative, including governance and management policy, and applying for charitable status for PAL Edmonton with Revenue Canada. Also on the list of priorities is the creation of a Supporting Cast element and establishing a website.

Business Plan Not Forgotten- In preparation for ongoing and ensuing projects the creation and finalization of the Chapter's Business Plan will continue.



Assessing PAL Van's Character-President Keith Martin Gordey emphasized the positive in his report to the PAL Canada AGM in

June. Reflecting on the "great strength of the organization's character... its ability to reevaluate and reinvent itself", Gordey reviewed a number of changes and ongoing challenges in his Chapter's evolutionary process from "capital fundraising" to fundraising through an Annual Campaign.

Transitions- In paying tribute to the many volunteers who have served PAL Vancouver, several were inducted into the esteemed *Order of the Red Nose*. (See Story p.7)

Gratitude to the Departed, High Expectations for Newcomers- Christine McDermott, outgoing Vice-President, and Secretary Rory Grewar did not stand for re-election and their devoted services were applauded and will be missed. At the same time, there are high expectations for recent additions to an excellent and hard-working Board (see last issue), confidently able to rely on the work of Executive Director Gary Glacken and an exemplary staff. More operational functions have been efficiently shifted from the Board to management and staff.

Navigating Rough Waters- Times are tough. Sustained contributions are essential for the continuation of PAL work and while budgeting targets were not quite reached in 2009 more funds were raised than the year before. Even through the recession, the community came through for PAL Vancouver as the Chapter looks beyond the building to offering services to the greater community.

Well Attended AGM in June- As recorded in our *Summer Palingenesis* a new Board is now in place and hard at work, following the AGM at the beginning of June and bolstered by a successful three-hour *Board Orientation Session* June 15th. Vancouver appears well on its way to successfully meet any new challenges.

MAUREEN FORRESTER

An early resident of Pal Place and lively supporter of

the PAL idea, one of the greatest singers this country has produced, Maureen Forrester, died in Toronto in mid-June from Alzheimer's disease. She was passionate about promoting Canadian arts and culture serving as Chair of the Canada Council and on the Executive



Committee of Actors' Equity, as well as seeking out and being constantly supportive of young singers and composers. She premiered and championed major vocal pieces by a wide range of Canadian composers. She has been described as "an authentic celebrity", one who "touched the Canadian nerve as no other singer of her time had done", and was the recipient of many honours, including almost three dozen honorary degrees from Canadian universities.

After thrilling the world with her glorious voice, musicianship and shining personality for decades Maureen retired to Pal Place but was forced to leave her friends there as her illness took hold. She leaves four daughters, Paula, Gina, Linda and Susie, a son Daniel, and 15 grandchildren.

STRATFORD FUNDING SUCCESS

THOR ARNGRIM ESTABLISHED ONE OF OUR FIRST PROFESSIONAL THEATRES

A West Coast theatre pioneer who, with the late *Stuart Baker*, established one of the earliest, full-time professional theatres in Canada, **Thor Arngrim** died in Vancouver in December as a result of complications from Parkinson's disease. Thor was 81 and an original resident of the *PAL Vancouver* lodge.

Though his remarkable story began in Regina he moved to Campbell River, B.C. with his adopted family at 14, soon leaving school and haunting every theatre performance he could find hoping for employment as a performer. In 1951, a stage veteran at 22, he co-founded Vancouver's

famed *Totem Theatre* as an outdoor summer stock company in West Vancouver, later moving to a permanent venue in a downtown Vancouver union hall where they produced plays ranging from *Charley's Aunt* to *No Exit*. As the newfangled medium of television cut into their audience base, "the boys" moved the company to Victoria, reviving the beautiful but then-derelict *MacPherson Playhouse*. However, *Totem* foundered and its creators went their separate ways . Stuart Baker died in Calgary some years ago.

Macmillan, the newlyweds set out for Toronto. In 1956, Thor found himself on Broadway in Tyrone Guthrie's production of Tamburlaine the Great and later alongside Albert Finney in Luther, as well as producing theatre at New Jersey's Grist Mill Playhouse. In 1993, returning to Vancouver, Norma continued to act and Thor to produce, especially a play about Alzheimer's disease, Strangers Among Us, winning two Jessie Richardson Awards. Norma predeceased Thor and he is survived by son Stefan and daughter Alison, both of whom continued in "the family business" Stefan working extensively in film and television in Vancouver and Alison as an actress and comedian in Los Angeles.

On Monday, September 13, the Avon Theatre was alive with laughter, talent and sentiment as PAL Stratford presented its fifth annual *Expect the Extraordinary* fundraising event. Entitled *Stratford Miscast*, the show was a musical cabaret featuring extremely talented performers in very unexpected roles. This year saw a record amount raised, some \$34,000, which will help PAL Stratford move closer to its goal of providing affordable


